<u>Governor Northam Announces 'Black History</u> <u>Month Historical Marker Contest'</u>

Competition could lead to new Historical Highway Marker



The competition invites students, teachers, and families to learn more about African Americans who have made important contributions to Virginia history. It invites ideas for new signs to teach history along Virginia's roadways.

The contest encourages schools to feature a different African American historical marker each day of February, provides teachers with resources to guide history discussions, promotes Black History Month events around the Commonwealth, and initiates a competition for students to submit ideas for new historical markers to the Virginia Department of Historical Resources.

"Black history is American history," **said Governor Northam**. "But for too long, we have told an inaccurate and simplified version of that history that did not include everyone. This competition is one new way to help tell a more true and inclusive story of our shared past. It means teaching history that accurately reflects the full spectrum of stories and experiences."

Regular Session

The General Assembly meets annually, beginning on the second Wednesday in January, for 60 days in even-numbered years and for 30 days in odd-numbered years, with an option to extend annual sessions for a maximum of 30 days. The <u>Senate of Virginia</u> and the <u>Virginia House of Delegates</u>, both bodies of the Virginia Legislature, meet in the historic, working Capitol building in Richmond, Virginia.

Newly Prescribed Standards of Quality

On October 17, 2019, the Board of Education prescribed new Standards of Quality for the commonwealth's public schools. The Standards of Quality describe the foundational instructional programs and support services all schools must provide. The *Constitution of Virginia* requires the Board of Education to prescribe Standards of Quality for the public schools of Virginia, subject to revision only by the General Assembly

The proposed new standards are aligned with the Board of Education's goals of promoting educational equity, supporting educator recruitment and retention, and helping students and schools achieve the board's graduation and accreditation requirements.

The <u>newly prescribed Standards of Quality</u> (Word) — and legislation necessary to enact the new standards — will be communicated to Governor Ralph Northam and the 2020 General Assembly, along with budget estimates required to support the new requirements and staffing ratios. Black History Month

As we move into February, many teachers, schools, and school divisions will provide programming, lessons and activities. We would like to encourage you to provide guidance across your school division as a means of support to the broader community. Please remember that Black history is much more than the civil rights era, but it is critical that students have a truthful—and complete—understanding of this foundational movement. Encourage and support teachers, schools, and your broader community to go beyond feel-good narratives and simple factoids by examining context and relevancy. This helps students learn a fuller and more accurate account of black history, including the often-oversimplified history of the civil rights movement.

In an article written by author Coshandra Dillard, <u>Teaching Tolerance</u>, January 23, 2019, it explores revisiting familiar themes or introducing new projects during Black History Month. It is important to resist reducing topics to feel-good factoids devoid of context. As we ALL work to improve our instruction and opportunities for learning, we encourage you to flood your teachers' with meaningful lessons, activities, sources (print and digital), and professional learning opportunities that will support deeper understanding and celebrate Black History Month.



To achieve a world in which all students are educated and inspired for lifelong inquiry and informed civic action, we must recognize the need for a responsive approach to social studies education that understands and incorporates contemporary cultural realities. Social studies shapes society. Through civic agency, advocacy, activism, and informed action, the guardrails of democracy, social studies can fulfill its promise of critical inquiry for civic life. For social studies to succeed, we must create an educative environment that:

- 1. Harnesses diversity and individualism,
- 2. Provides equal educational opportunities and confronts racialized narratives,
- 3. Forges common contemporary civic values and social harmony in a pluralistic society,
- 4. Adopts pedagogical approaches that promote civility, inclusion, collaborative reasoning and deliberation, critical inquiry, and participatory experiences, and
- 5. Capitalizes on the positive possibilities of the internet and social media.

The Inquiry Design Model

The Inquiry Design Model (IDM)TM is a distinctive approach to creating curriculum and instructional materials that honors teachers' knowledge and expertise, avoids over-prescription, and focuses on the central elements of the instructional design process. The Inquiry Design Model is coauthored by S.G. Grant, John Lee, and Kathy Swan who worked as leaders and writers in the C3 Framework project.
